It won't be long now before we are in the grips of Winter and if we get snow this year it is best to be prepared.

Don't be shy and make sure your neighbours are coping; many people find it difficult to ask for help. Can you clear their drive, while you're clearing yours? Can they get to the shops? Here's advice issued during the last great fall of snow;

The Snow Code issued by the Department of Transport

Clear the snow and ice early in the day

It's easier to move fresh, loose snow rather than hard snow that has packed together from people walking on it. So if possible, start removing the snow and ice in the morning. If you remove the top layer of snow in the morning, any sunshine during the day will help melt any ice beneath. You can then cover the path with salt before nightfall to stop it refreezing overnight.



Preventing slips

- Pay extra attention to clearing snow and ice from steps and steep pathways you might need to use more salt on these areas
- Use salt or sand not water
- Don't make the pathways more dangerous by causing them to refreeze. If you use water to melt the snow, it may refreeze and turn to black ice. Black ice increases the risk of injuries as it is invisible and very slippery.
- You can melt snow or prevent black ice by spreading some salt on the area you have cleared. You can use ordinary table or dishwasher salt - a tablespoon for each square metre you clear should work. Don't use the salt found in salting bins - this will be needed to keep the roads clear.
- Be careful not to spread salt on plants or grass as it may damage them.
- If you don't have enough salt, you can also use sand or ash. These won't stop the path icing over as effectively as salt, but will provide good grip underfoot.

Take care where you move the snow

When you're shovelling snow, take care where you put it so it doesn't block people's paths or drains. Make sure you make a path down the middle of the area to be cleared first, so you have a clear surface to walk on. Then shovel the snow from the centre of the path to the sides.

Affordable Housing off Lancaster Road

Planning permission has been granted by Wyre Council for the building of 11 affordable homes on the site behind Bradley's Electrical, Lancaster Road. Access to the site is next to the bridge over Pilling Water, the trees and shrubs along the water course are now protected with a Tree Preservation Order and any arboreal work must be in consultation with Wyre Council.

Affordable Housing off School Lane

This development by Partners Ltd. is about to be handed over to Regenda and filled with Pilling residents.



Affordable houses in Pilling are for Pilling residents, who wish to live in the village but are not eligible for a mortgage or do not want one and can show a connection to the village. The houses are partly for rent and partly for shared ownership, either way it is very important that those applying are registered:

Water Meeting in Pilling

Pilling Parish Council arranged a meeting to discuss the many water problems which occur in the village and beyond into the hinterland. The meeting was attended by Eric Ollerenshaw, MP, United Utilities, the EA, NE and the NFU. Due to recent and continuing budget cuts the EA has pulled back from their cyclical maintenance of water courses and are only able to clean out the latter reaches of the Broadfleet, Pilling Water, from Bone Hill Bridge to the sea wall.

This has now put the responsibility of dyke cleaning on the landowner, who must ensure that the water is running freely and their dykes are not preventing water running from adjacent land. The EA has produced a booklet to guide landowners through their responsibilities and this is available by putting 'Living on the Edge' into Google.

Pilling 20 20 – Things looking Rosy!!

The project to bring up-to-date recreation facilities to Pilling is looking promising and we are hopeful that by Easter we will know the outcome of the planning applications. The design of the replacement for the Memorial hall has almost been agreed. A steel framed building with very environmentally friendly walls being favoured with underfloor heating being generated by a ground source pump. Hopefully the roof will carry numerous solar panels which should help make the hall very economical to run. Two football pitches will be provided as well as a multi sports play area which, along with the hall, should cater for all types of sports. A much improved and enlarged children's play area is planned. Villagers had the opportunity to view the plans on Saturday 15th Nov. when at the open day in the Comrades room there were several useful and constructive ideas.



If you are able to help in any way we would be grateful as talents of every description are needed to bring the plans to fruition – we need anyone who can help with funding applications, design of facilities, project management anything that will help towards the fulfilment of this exciting project which will shape the future of Pilling.
